SOL Essential Questions:

- What were the factors that produced World War I?
- What were the major events of the war?
- Who were the major leaders?

SOL Essential Understandings & Essential Knowledge (WHII.11) identified in the Museum's **World War I Gallery**:

- Diplomatic Failures
- Militarism
- United States enters the war
- Woodrow Wilson
- Enormous cost of the war in lives, property and social disruption

SOL Essential Questions:

- What were the causes of World War II?
- What were the major events of World War II?
- Who were the major leaders of World War II?
- What were the outcomes of World War II?
- What were the international cooperative organizations created after World War II?

SOL Essential Understandings & Essential Knowledge (WHII.12) identified in the Museum's **World War II Gallery**:

- Major theaters of World War II included Asia and the Pacific Islands.
- Aggression by totalitarian powers
- Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor
- Atomic bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki
- Franklin D. Roosevelt
- General Douglas MacArthur
- Hideki Tojo
- Emperor Hirohito
- U.S. occupation of Japan

WHII.13: The student will demonstrate knowledge of major events and outcomes of the Cold War.

Following a visit to the Museum, students will be able to answer these **SOL Essential Questions**:

- What events led to the Cold War?
- How did the Cold War influence conflicts in Eastern Asia after World War II?
- What was the policy of containment?

SOL Essential Understandings & Essential Knowledge (WHII.12, 13) identified in the Museum's **Korean War Gallery** and **Vietnam War Gallery**:

- Competition between the U.S. and U.S.S.R. laid the foundation for the Cold War.
- The Cold War influenced conflicts around the world.
- The presence of nuclear weapons influenced patterns of conflict and cooperation since 1945.

- Division of Europe—Iron Curtain
- Establishment of the United Nations
- Containment: policy for preventing the spread of communism
